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Dr. Zhoumeng Lin is an Associate Professor in the Department of Environmental and Global Health and a member of the Center for Environmental and Human Toxicology at the University of Florida. He received a B.Med. in Preventive Medicine from Southern Medical University in 2009 and a Ph.D. in Toxicology from the University of Georgia in 2013. He completed his postdoctoral training in the Institute of Computational Comparative Medicine at Kansas State University in 2016. He was an Assistant Professor from 2016 to 2021 and then an Associate Professor from March to May 2021 at Kansas State University, prior to joining the University of Florida as an Associate Professor in May 2021. Dr. Lin's research is focused on the development and application of computational technologies, especially physiologically based pharmacokinetic (PBPK) modeling, to study food safety, nanoparticle and chemical risk assessment. He is a co-author of more than eighty peer-reviewed publications. His publications have received several awards, including the Society of Toxicology Biological Modeling Specialty Section Best Paper Award in 2022. Dr. Lin teaches a graduate level course on PBPK modeling every year. He is a co-editor and a co-author of five chapters of a recently published textbook entitled "Physiologically Based Pharmacokinetic (PBPK) Modeling: Methods and Applications in Toxicology and Risk Assessment". Dr. Lin has served as an ad hoc grant reviewer for several agencies, including USDA and NIH. He has served as an external reviewer on several risk assessment documents on different environmental chemicals for different agencies, including US EPA, CDC, and FDA. He has been a member of Society of Toxicology since 2011. He was a Secretary/Treasurer of Central States Society of Toxicology (CSSOT) from 2018 to 2020. He is now the Vice President-Elect of the Biological Modeling Specialty Section (BMSS) and a Councilor of the Nanoscience and Advanced Materials Specialty Section (NAMSS) of Society of Toxicology.
